

Pioneers take 2nd at NCAA

What more could the Pioneers do — except maybe win this thing?

Oakland University's men's swim team won eight of the 20 events at last week's NCAA Division II national championship swim meet, and still finished a distant second to California State-Bakersfield. Bakersfield, coached by former OU coach Ernie Maglischo, totaled 571 points to OU's 406. California State-Chico was third (243), followed by Shippensburg (243) and Clarion (204).

OU's women tied their best finish ever, finishing third behind Cal State-Northridge (397) and North Dakota (280). The Lady Pioneers scored 270.

For the men, at least they had the NCAA II swimmer of the year again.

Sophomore Hilton Woods got that with wins in the 50-yard (20.00) and 200-yard (1:38.35) freestyle. Woods' time in the 50 set a new NCAA II record. He also finished second in the 100 free by just .01 behind defending champion Ted Hollahan of Northridge, who won in 45.01. Woods was also second in the 100 back in 51.46.

OU's other individual champion for the men was Erik Strom in the 500 free (4:30.23).

The Pioneers did just what coach Pete Howland said they'd have to do

to win the title — win all five relays. Still, they finished second.

On Wednesday, Rich Orr, Jim Surovic (from Redford Catholic Central/Farmington Hills), Eric McElquham and Dave Rogowski combined to win the 200 medley relay in 1:31.34. On Thursday, Strom, Eric Dresbach, Scott Harris and Woods combined to win the 800 free relay in 6:40.63.

ON FRIDAY, Rogowski, Jeff Selfert, Jon Teal (from Redford Catholic Central) and McElquham won the 200 free relay in 1:22.46, and Orr, Surovic, Dresbach and Woods captured the 400 medley relay in 3:21.55. Saturday, OU completed its sweep with a first in the 400 free relay by Rogowski, Dresbach, McElquham and Woods in 3:01.08, a new NCAA II record.

For the OU women, Nikki Kelsey was named NCAA II diver of the year after capturing the one-meter event with 409.95 points and finishing second on the three-meter with 445.55 points.

The Lady Pioneers had one other individual national champion: Lyn Schermer won the 200 free in 1:51.75. Schermer, a freshman, also was third in both the 200 (2:07.50) and 400 (4:32.13) individual medleys, and fourth in the 100 free (52.24). Three women relays finished second: Lisa Guffoy, Kerry Leavoy, Shelly Pilarski and Dana Kennedy (from Birmingham Groves) in the 200 free (1:35.89); Schermer, Ginie Johnson (from Plymouth Canton), Deanna Fridley and Guffoy in the 400 free (2:38.20); and Guffoy, Leavoy, Schermer and Kennedy in the 400 free (3:29.33).

Trenton goalie tough on Warriors

Birmingham Brother Rice was confronted with a nagging problem Wednesday night in the Class A hockey state quarterfinal at Oak Park's Computer Arena.

Pitted against top-ranked Southgate Anderson, the No. 4-ranked Warriors had a tough time scoring as they lost, 3-1, to the Titans.

But the lack of goals certainly can't be attributed to a lethargic offense. The Warriors fired everything but a cannon at Titan goalie Rich Nagy, but the junior goaltender mothered every shot that came his way and finished the game with 41 saves.

"If Nagy isn't the No. 1 goalie in the state at his age, I don't know who is," said Anderson coach Frank Di-Cristofaro. "He is just a great goalie. If it wasn't for Nagy and our penalty killing, Rice could have killed us."

EVEN WHEN the Warriors were on the power play (three times), they still couldn't get the puck into the net.

"I think one of the critical points of the game were the two power plays we had back-to-back, and the Southgate goalie stopped us," Rice coach Bruce Antloch said. "He is a tough goaltender to get by."

"Last year the power play helped us in the playoffs. We have a lot of five kids back from last year's power play unit."

"We got the shots off, Nagy's just tough. You don't get a lot of rebounds from him. He covers everything."

On paper, it appeared the Warriors had the best of Southgate. Rice outshot the Titans 42-24 and had three power-play opportunities to Southgate's one. But in the statistic that matters — points on the scoreboard — the Titans won easily.

SCOTT STEWART scored Titans first goal at 1:48 into the game on Southgate's first shot of the game.

The senior defender took a pass from Brad Lindstrom at his own end of the rink, skated to the Warrior blue line then beat Rice goalie — sophomore Pat Saunders — with a wicked slap shot.

Moments later, Lindstrom was called for hooking, giving Rice its first power play opportunity.

Defense was the key this time, as the Warriors were limited to just three shots while holding a man advantage.

Rice's Scott Lockwood went to the box for interference at 10:45, and Tony Thompson was called for charging at 11:08, giving Southgate a two-man advantage. With 33 remaining in Lockwood's penalty, Charles Matthews scored what proved to be the winning goal for Anderson.

THE WARRIORS finally got on the board when Zack Fryer took a pass from Thompson and beat Nagy with 05 remaining in the first period.

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Young returns to helm

The new boys track coach at Farmington High School is no stranger to the team or sport. Jerry Young takes over for Dave Catherman as the head coach after serving as an assistant during Catherman's nine-year tenure. Young had been the head coach from 1967-79 and led the Falcons to several Inter-Lakes League championships.

Catherman will remain as assistant to Young, overseeing all of the field events. In addition, John McKenzie, who guided Redford Union to the Class A title in 1966, will coach the Farmington sprinters and hurdlers. He had been out of coaching for several years.

"We had an agreement that we would switch," Young said. "We have a lot of time in the program, and we want it to be in able hands. "It's kinda fun being the head man in some respects, but it's a lot more work. I have an outstanding staff; I've never worked with a better group."

Young added the Falcons have 65 boys out for the team but, unlike recent years, will be short of big-name stars. "The last few years we had outstanding individuals," he said. "We've got a lot of inexperienced kids who haven't been front-line people with statewide experience."

Young is well known for his work with the Farmington boys cross country team, having been a head coach in that sport since 1966. The Falcons were among the last five Western Lakes Activities Association titles under Young.
