power is just as important as having power.  
Many of their activities are done with neither MOTOREDE or JBS identification or participation to

give the impression of representing all quarters of the community;  
Spreading of alleged "actual cases" and horror stories concerning deviant behavior by teachers and harm to children receiving sex education;  
Use of unsupported information presented as fact, with the information often identical to propaganda being used by other right-wing extremists in other districts and other states;  
Flyers reveal a preoccupation with a sinister, evil plot to destroy the morals, incentives and individuality of youth.  
Sex education is often connected with other social

ills, particularly narcotics and pornography, as being related. Another favorite target is sensitivity training;  
Attacks on personal integrity, accusations of disloyalty and distrust of those who support sex education, including such behavior as anonymous letters and phone calls and whispering campaigns.

GIVEN by the ADL spokesman as reasons for MOTOREDE's campaign in Farmington were the following reasons why the Birch Society is becoming involved in local politics:  
"The apathy of moderates is more in evidence and offers

more potent an opportunity for an extremist minority, at the local level!" because turnouts for school elections are low.  
"There is a greater emotional pull on issues that hit home, particularly when emotions can be buttressed with a manufactured fear."  
"Greater political pressure, concentrated and personal, can be brought to bear on local, county and state officials, and on local businessmen."  
"Pressures can be tightly organized, and it is easy to mount saturation propaganda drives reaching great percentages of the local population."
