IN FARMINGTON, as  
elsewhere, 1971 will be the  
beginning of changes which  
the new decade will require.

The proposed solutions for  
the problems of the sixties  
have been tried and re-tried.  
Some of the problems still  
remain and new problems  
will crop up as more and  
more people attempt to live  
on the same amount of land.

The new year may be a

time of stress as new solu-  
tions are proposed. Certainly  
there will be adjustments to  
be made during the next 12  
months in the thinking of all  
of us.

During 1971, we will be  
hearing more from the eco-  
logists, the psychologists and  
the "leisureologists." Econo-

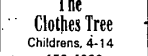

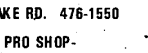

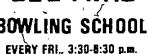
