

# John Glenn brings halt to Harrison win streak

Westland John Glenn dealt Farmington Hills Harrison its first two losses of the baseball season Monday, taking a doubleheader from the host Hawks 8-2 and 6-3.

Glenn, 10-1 overall and 6-1 in the Western Lakes Activities Association, got complete games out of Bobby Lawrence and Jerry Koester. Harrison is 6-2 overall.

Lawrence moved his record to 3-1 on the mound, scattering six hits and striking out two in the first game. Starter Craig Murray suffered the loss for Harrison, leaving in the fifth inning when Glenn struck for two runs.

Jerry Shippe was 3-for-4 with one RBI for Glenn, while Jeff Elkins and Bryant Satterlee had one hit and drove in two runs each.

Jeff Skinner and Jason Lichtman collected two hits apiece for Harrison and Gary Devine was walked three times.

Koester gave up six hits in Game 2, but fanned five in outting losing pitcher Steve Miller, who also went the distance.

Glenn trailed 3-4 entering the seventh, but scored four times in the top of the inning to take the lead for good. Lawrence's two-run homer highlighted the rally.

Satterlee paced the 10-hit Glenn attack with a 4-for-4 performance. Paul Hayes had a fourth-inning solo homer and Eric Slover and Skinner had two hits apiece.

Harrison scored two runs in the bottom of the seventh and got the tying run to the plate with two outs but could not score again.

**REDFORD CC 4-10, BISHOP BORQUESS 1-2** Redford Bishop Borgees was listed as the home team at Capital Park Monday, but Redford Catholic Central acted as if it owned the premises, sweeping Borgees 4-1 and 10-2.

**CLARENCEVILLE 7, LUTHERAN WEST 6** Don Glernman had a game-winning RBI in the bottom of the fifth-inning Monday for host Livonia Clarenceville, improving the Trojans to 4-4 overall, 3-4 in the Metro Conference.

Dave Petrie earned the win, scattering seven hits, and Rich Roy picked up the save, tossing one-third of an inning. Andy Weighill had four of Clarenceville's 12 hits and stole four bases and Glernman was 3-for-3. Jason Bouchard was the losing pitcher for Detroit Lutheran West.

**TAYLOR CENTER 6, THURSTON 4** Taylor Center, the state's No. 1 ranked team in Class A, moved to 13-0 overall and 7-0 in Tri-River League play Tuesday, stopping host Redford Thurston, 6-4.

The scoreboard indicated North Farmington and Livonia Stevenson played to a 1-1 tie Monday in girls soccer.

Sometimes scoreboards lie. North coach Matt Davis treated it like a win. The host Raiders, a team trying to build tradition, moved to 2-5-2 overall. Stevenson, the winner of two Class A titles this decade, is 3-2-2 overall.

"For us it's a victory," Davis said. "It's a good score. We've lost some disappointing matches recently (losing the last four games by a total of 23 goals), but the girls are coming along."

No North player is improving more than Leanne Adie, the goalkeeper, who kept the Raiders in the game by kicking away 30 of Stevenson's 31 shots. Adie made an important save on a penalty kick when the score was tied in the second half.

"It sounds like a hockey score when you face 31 shots," Davis said. "She played phenomenally and so did our sweeper, Donna O'Brien."

Cheryl Walter scored North's only goal, breaking a scoreless tie early in the second half when she picked up a rebound off a shot by Kim Benson.

Fourth places went to Hood in the 400 (1:04.7) and Kim Cook in the 100 (1:35.5). In the 800 relay, Gerigk, Megan Lombardi and Hood also took fourth (4:25.3).

Fifth-place showings belonged to shot putter Charesse Sanders, who had a toss of 33-10, and Mary Beth Strand, who clocked 53.3 in the 300 hurdles.

In addition, Jeanette Turner was sixth in the 400 (1:01-11) and Sullivan sixth in the 800 run (2:35). Brigitte Dery finished seventh in the 3,200 run (12:14).

**TWO DAYS** after beating highly-regarded Livonia Churchill, Farmington Hills Harrison turned in a disappointing seventh-place effort Saturday at the eight-team Novi Invitational.

First place went to Milan, which was followed by Dexter and Novi. Harrison finished with 17 points.

"We're a young team and typically we're up and down," coach Mark Babcock said. "When we're up, it's hard to keep them up. But we'll be back. We're very capable."

The shuttle hurdle relay team of Jane Peters, Alanco Jarvenpaa, Michele Rebojy and Maria Chalogianis took third place in 1:11.5.

# Weintraub no-hits N'ville; Falcons sweep Churchill

North Farmington pitcher Debbie Weintraub's no-hitter keyed a major victory for the Raiders, and Farmington High's softball team forgot its recent troubles with a double-header sweep Monday.

Weintraub threw her sh-hitter against previously unbeaten Northville in a 2-1 triumph for North, which later dropped the nightcap 10-0.

Farmington had won only two of 10 games prior to Monday's action, but the Falcons improved their record by beating Livonia Churchill 13-5 and 5-3.

Lisa Gale picked up the win in Farmington's 5-3 win, fanning two and surrendering four hits. The Falcons got two runs in both the first and second innings and added an insurance run in the fifth.

Bonnie Wheelis had two hits and an RBI for the Falcons, and Lisa Rockafellow's sacrifice fly in the second inning drove in the eventual game-winning run.

Rockafellow earned the win in the first game, scattering seven hits and striking out eight. Wheelis was 3-for-2 with three RBI, and Michelle Miller drove in two runs with a bases-loaded single in the fourth.

Farmington is 4-3 overall, 3-6 in the Western Lakes Activities Association.

Weintraub gave a masterful performance for North, outdueling Northville sensation Amy Friemund. The Raiders, 2-3 overall, 5-3 in the WLA, scored the winning run in the seventh, without the aid of a hit.

Weintraub led off the inning by being safe on an error, and two throwing errors brought her home. Weintraub also struck out two and walked only two. North didn't have much success against Friemund either, fanning seven times, and managing only four hits.

Weintraub opened the scoring in the second by sending Kelly Coulson home with a base hit.
