

John Glenn brings halt to Harrison win streak

Westland John Glenn dealt Farmington Hills Harrison its first two losses of the baseball season Monday, taking a doubleheader from the host Hawks 8-2 and 6-3.

Glenn, 10-1 overall and 6-1 in the Western Lakes Activities Association, got complete games out of Bob Lawrence and Jerry Koester. Harrison is 6-2 overall.

Glenn's first win moved his record to 3-1 on the season, and Harrison's win and striking out two in the first game. Starier Craig Murray suffered the loss for Harrison, leaving in the fifth inning when Glenn struck for two runs.

Jerry Shipp was 3-for-4 with one RBI for Glenn, while Jeff Ellkins and Bryant Satterlee had one hit and drove in two runs each.


