# House committee nixes incentives plan for school

The House Education Committee shot down a key bill in Gov. James Blanchard's school quality program — a system of incentive grants to improved schools.

Opposition cut across party lines and across city, suburban lines, noted chairman William Keith, D-Garden (div.

""" Just don't like it," sald Rep. Nelishn Saunders, D-Detroit, who absitained. "This says 75 percent (of buildings) would receive no monetary reward even if they're successful under this bill."

THE VOTE Tuesday on House Bill 4444 was 8 in favor, 9 against, with 2 not voting. Ten votes are needed to report it to the House floor. Yes votes came from Keith and a scattering of Detroit and outstate

scattering of Detroit and outsame members.
Voting no were Reps. James Kos-teva, D-Canton, Lyn Bankes, R-Livo-nia, and a vocal William Bryant, R-frosse Polinte.
The bill still unfunded, would give \$15 million to the state Department of Education to reward up to 25 per cent of the buildings in any one dis-trict for a three-year program of im-provements.

provements. Sponsor is freshman Rep. Ted Wallace, D-Detroit.
Tuesday's vote came on a substitute version that reduced the state's rule-making power. But it still falled to satisfy some committee members.

REPUBLICANS, Joined by Kos-ldva, removed a section requiring an irhprovement plan to be approved and signed by the local superintend-ent and the president of the teachers' union. Only the local school board would have to approve it.

"I don't see the superintendent or the president of the union having veto power," objected Rep. Susan Grimes Munsell, R-Howell. "I don't feel the staff should have the right to override it. Isn't that why we elect a

school board — to represent the tar-payers and parenta?"
"It should be a collaborative ef-fort," said Rep. Alma Stallworth, D-betroit, favoring the union president veto.
Added Rep. Bart Stupak, D-Menoninee: "We've got to have ev-eryone on board. You're imposing work conditions on the bargaining unit (with a school improvement plan).

COMMITTEE MEMBERS were doubtful about operating details.

"What does 'at risk' mean?" asked Rep. Terry London, R. Marywille.

"I really can't speak to that," answered a stall member from the Department of Education, adding that there are nationwide attempts to identify popils who are at risk of dropping or or failing the moment they enter school.

"We are actually diluting the dropout program," said Rep. Claude Triin, R. Waterford. "I'll vote no."

Nate Jonker, D.Clio, "but let's put the money where we need it . . . We already have proven categorials," he said, referring to programs for pregnanteens, drugs and transportation.

THERE WAS an undercurrent of Republican resentment at Blanchard's effort to put his name on a program administered by a department under the control of a separately elected State Board of Education.

the use or season ..., and ming, ming, ming, or GAIN funds will be recognized as shining examples for other schools to follow. A merit awards program almost identical to GAIN was just proposed by President Bush to encourage educational excellence across the nation."

### What schools may GAIN

"GAIN" stands for Governor's Achievement Incentives — an esti-mated \$15 million the first year in rewards to school buildings, not dis-

mated \$15 million the first year in reward to school buildings, not districts, for improvements.

A local school board would present the Department of Education a plan for improvement. The state would score:

• 40 percent for improvement in academic performance.

• 20 percent for reducing numbers of dropouts.

• 20 percent for reducing numbers of dropouts.

• 20 percent for other indicators—college entrance, participation in school cubts, an increase in graduates placed in jobs, and so on. (It is expected, but not decided, that a \$10 million school dropout program would be folded into GAG when the school cubts and strict could receive a grant in one year. The average grant is expected to be \$15,000.

The grants must be apent on "discretionary school improvement" approved by the school board, "but shall not supplant regular school funding.
