## EMU student chief from Hills

Eastern Michigan University's student government has a newly elected student body president, Michael Dega, after elections held last month. Dega, a Farmington Hills senior and president of the Sigma Phi Epsilon fraternity at EMU, defeated incumbent student president Jerry Raymond 1,120-784.

Andrzej Raczkoski, a sophomore majoring in history and political science, was elected a student senator. Aissa Dora, a junior majoring in telecommunications and film,

was re-elected a student senator. Dega, a public law and government major, said he was "extremely excited" about his upcoming term. "I believe we'll be able to do a lot for the students. I'd like to bring the students and administration together, to work with, instead of against, each other," he said.

DEGA SAID his first priority upon taking office will be to schedule a meeting of university President-elect William Shelton and student leaders to discuss campus issues.

"I will also be setting up two committees: one to recommend action to improve road conditions and one to improve parking conditions," he said.  
Another priority Dega mentioned is his plan to meet with university and city officials to discuss establishing a Greek Row. "Zoning in the city has split Greeks apart and kept some of them from having houses," Dega said. "We want to create new housing opportunities in a suitable location."

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**ASPIRIN AND INFLAMMATION**  
Joint inflammation is a process in which noxious chemicals enter a joint and damage or destroy it. Stopping inflammation requires the presence of a substance that can halt the generation of these chemicals; aspirin is such an agent.  
Not only can aspirin inhibit inflammation, but the drug can prevent the fever and decrease the pain that accompanies inflammation.  
All other anti-inflammatory drugs, with the exception of steroids, work on the principle of aspirin, and are substitutes for it. To date, physicians have not found that any of these substitutes work better than aspirin.  
Thus, for fighting inflammation, aspirin remains the first drug of choice. If you are allergic to it, or if it does not work for you, then the substitute anti-inflammatory drugs are worth a try. But remember, physicians experienced in treating joint conditions turn to aspirin first.  
In this period of great technological achievement, it is hard to believe that the "old ways are the best ways." But in the case of aspirin therapy for arthritis, this saying retains its wisdom.
