Village Antique Show staged to support programs for youth

The fifth annual Village Antiques Show, considered by many to be one of the top five antiques events in the country, is set for the weekend of May 12-14 in Lovett Hall, Greenfield Village.

The fine merchandise that comes from 47 dealers in the country reflects the quality and scope of the collections in the Henry Ford Museum.

The show is staged by a conglomerate of persons from the metro area who have two things in common - they all enjoy antiques, and they all support the Henry Ford Museum and Greenfield Village educational programs which benefit more

than 350,000 children each year.

Programs range from hands-on participation and organized tours to special overnight dormitory programs and actual class experiences in one of the museum's several one-room historic school buildings. The programs are offered to families who visit, or organized school and youth groups.

All of the proceeds from the show perpetuate the educational programs.

Free lectures on the practical aspects of antiquing are part of the show. These will be offered this year at 3 p.m. Friday and Saturday.

Preview night is Thursday, May 11. The elegant evening offers a preview of the antiques for sale, an open bar and gourmet dinner. Benefactor tickets are \$125 and patron tickets are \$100.

Show hours are from 11 a.m. to 9 p.m. Friday; from 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. Saturday; and from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. Sunday.

Admission is \$5 at the door, or \$4 if purchased in advance.
