Cheryl Waller's bat trick kept alive North Farmington's hopes for at least a .500 finish in its soccer season, as the Raiders blanked hapless Farmington Hills 5-0 Monday at North.

The score was 0 to 5, thanks to Waller and Donna O'Brien, who assisted on two of Waller's three goals. O'Brien also scored, and Kirsten Harrison added a goal.

The shutout was goalie Leanne Adle's second of the season.

North improved to 3-6-2 with the win. The Raiders, who hosted Livonia Franklin last night, have two games remaining on their regular-season schedule at Plymouth Salem Monday and at home against Walled Lake Central Wednesday.
