Lutherans to host Friendship Sunday

Sunday, June 4, Prince of Peace Lutheran Church will begin its Summer Worship Schedule. Only one worship service is scheduled to be conducted on Sunday mornings. The time selected is 9:30 a.m. Since many have weekend plans which take them out of town, a Monday evening Vesper Service will start at 7:30 p.m. This schedule will continue through the month of August.

Larry Engelhardt, chairman of the board of evangelism, stated that Prince of Peace is committed to setting aside certain Sundays each year when the community is invited to join the congregation in worship.

"The objective for Friendship Sunday," said Engelhardt, "is for people, principally those who are new in the area or those who have no church home, to come and examine first hand what we have to offer here at Prince of Peace spiritually."

The worship encounter will follow an order of service which is used on a regular basis, using familiar hymns to be sung by the congregation and appropriate Scripture readings to be read by a lay person.

The sermon, delivered by the Rev. T. Richard Marais Sr., pastor of the congregation, "will briefly outline who we are, what we believe, teach and stand for as Lutheran Christians," Engelhardt said.

Though the sermon will address itself to the teachings of the church as outlined in The Apostles' Creed, it will be based on a text lifted from scripture.

SPECIAL MUSIC arrangements by the senior choir will be offered under the direction of Salvatore F. Mancuso, minister of music. Immediately following a message for the children by the pastor, awards will be presented to Sunday School students by co-superintendents Dianna Kunz and Lynda Kulssel.

While scripture does not make any reference to "A Celebration of Friendship," the New Testament does present a very clear pattern of how the first Christians went about turning their world upside down with the Gospel message of God's love for people in the Person of Jesus as The Christ.

"Our principal mission and hope

here at Prince of Peace," said Marais, "is to both proclaim the truth of God's love in Christ and warmly invite those who do not know Him or have no church home of their own. It is in church where God, through word and sacrament, is revealed in a very exciting way."

As a memento of this occasion, all guests and members of the congregation will be presented with a lapel

cross, selected as the logo for The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod. "The cross presents a bold witness of the hope and mission of what we are to be about as Christians," Marais said.

An opportunity for fellowship will also be provided immediately following the special Service of Friendship. Coffee and refreshments will be served to all in attendance.
