

Falcons shuffle lineup to win regional crown

Coach Bruce Brown could easily point to any number of individuals who made key contributions to farmington's first regional title in girls Class A track and field.

To put the team together, Brown took Gaul out of the 300 hurdles and asked Reed to turn around and run the relay after finishing the 100 dash.

Murray stars again for champion Hawks

Craig Murray keeps mowing 'em down from the mound, and the Farmington Hills Harrison pitching ace set a record doing it Monday.

The senior right-hander struck out 12 batters and established a school standard while guiding the Hawks to a 1.5 o victory over visiting Livonia Stevenson.

Murray's latest strikeout total gives him 81 for the season and surpasses the mark of 79 set by Tim Hammer 15 years ago. In raling his record to 7-1, he also tossed a three-hillter, which included a pair of walks and one sit be starman.

"He's gained tremendous confidence as the year has gone on." Harrison cache John Herrington said, "and he's been able to get the fauthall and curveball over the plate. He's always had good stilf, but now he's throwing it for strikes."
