Enters Contest At Demery's --- Wins \$12,000 Top Prize

What to do with a windfall of an extra \$100 a month for 10 years isn't bothering Mrs. Hubert Hollier, of Orchard Lake, one little bit. She's too happy over winning the princely prize in the Playtex Bra Sweepstakes which she entered last March at the Demery's Department Store in Farmington.

The prize winner merely bought a Playtex and sent proof of her purchase into the company.

Fate took over from there, making Mrs. Hollier the nation's winner of the grand prize.

SHE RECEIVED HER first \$100 check last week from Robert Young, district manager for Playtex. Dignitaries at the ceremony included Mrs. Charles A. Peck, president of Demery's, and Robert Demers, manager of the Farmington Demery's Store.

Mrs. Hollier thought something was in the air concerning the prize because a Pinkerton detective visited her several weeks ago with important-looking forms to be filled out.

County Outdated --Pursell

Carl Pursell, Republican candidate for the newly formed Wayne County Board of Supervisors called for a program of fresh new leadership to implement much needed reform in Wayne County. "It is the most out-dated and antiquated governmental level we have," said Pursell, a candidate in the 26th (Livonia-Plymouth) district.

"After reducing the board from 130 to 26, we can begin to establish new lines of responsibilities. I believe the board should consider hiring a chief executive administrator to be fully responsible for all county operations and report directly to the new board.

"This would eliminate the present back-passing such as seen in the county jail problems," stated Pursell.

ALSO, PURSELL noted, it will be important to recognize that local units of governments are more and more sharing and effecting programs with their neighboring governments.

"It is therefore important that the next elected supervisor from this district have experience with all the six governments in the 26th district.

"I am pleased to have worked with every government in this district over the last few years," said Pursell. Leadership and experience in government, education, and the business world will be needed to provide sound principles to the re-organization of county government.

PURSELL, selected as the Plymouth Jaycees' "Outstanding Young Man of the Year" in 1966, also remarked firmly on the proposed salary scale mentioned by other candidates. "I am opposed to major salary levels for members of the new board of supervisors," said Pursell. "Hire a chief administrator and let the board set policy. The county is operating with a deficit budget now," stated Pursell.

"Even increases in present major office holders in the county now approved by the Ways and Means Committee are ill-timed and improper in this inflationary period. We should be holding the line and develop a more responsible fiscal budget."

Ombudsman Named At U-D

Appointment of the first "ombudsman" at the University of Detroit was announced this week by Dr. A. Raymond Barall Jr., vice president for academic affairs.

Thomas F. Davis, dean of Freshman Studies, was named to the post. The idea for the post was suggested by the University Student Government President, Harry Minor.

The term "ombudsman" comes from the Swedish, who developed the post as a method for helping common citizens deal with an increasingly complex government.

U. of D. was the scene last winter of student demonstrations against alleged authoritarian methods of the administration.

"As Ombudsman, Davis will function primarily as a liaison between students and administration and/or faculty, investigating any complaints or suggestions brought to his attention by members of the student body," Minor said. "This post is meant to cut through unnecessary red tape and act as an entrance way to the academic community at large.

"I have found that every voice can be heard. Each administrator, dean and faculty member has tackled every problem I've presented and has been pleased to help," Davis added.

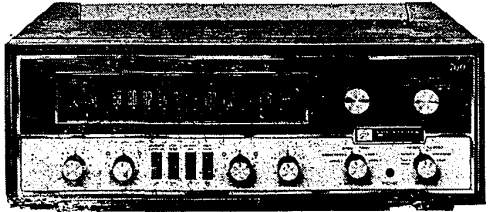

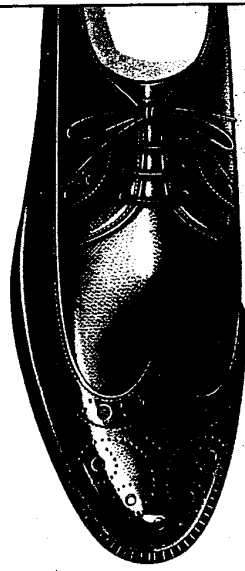
