Battling cancer

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"I received mail, cards, flowers, gifts, people thinking of me and praying for me. But a lot of people just don't know what to say, they just don't know how to cope when someone has cancer. Cancer terrifies people," she said.

She credits Carl Simonton's book "Getting Well Again," his suggested visualization and imagery techniques, private counseling and using relaxation tapes as instrumental in her recovery.

Even so, she has more surgery in front of her, and she is living with the fact that the cancer may return. "The chances of it coming back are good," she said. "I let myself cry. I talk it out. It goes away, but it never entirely disappears."

"WHATEVER I had to do to live I was willing to take on, and I will take on whatever comes. I will drive again and I will sing again," she said.

Her positive attitude is shared by her family and her fiancé, Chip Pisoni, whom she will marry in August.

At her suggestion the Michigan Cancer Foundation has started a support group exclusively for young adults with cancer.

"I like support groups. They are very helpful. But there was nothing in the (metro) area just for people in my particular situation. I attended support groups which took in people of all ages and their concerns weren't necessarily mine. I met a woman at 81 who was wondering if she was ever going to see her great-grandchild. I am wondering if I will ever be a mother," she said.

"I want to share whatever I have learned and benefited out of this with others. We meet at 6 p.m. Wednesdays in the Michigan Cancer Foundation building (in Detroit). Seven of us — between 17 and 30 — showed up the first night. It's a very positive way to help one another," she said.
