# \$85 million school budget adopted

Farmington Public Schools will levy all the millage it can under the Headlee Tax Limitation Amendment levy all the milinge it can under the Headlee Tax Limitation Amendment for the 1989-90 school year, giving the district an \$85.5 million opera-

the district an \$8.5. million opera-ing budget.
A resident whose house has a mar-ket value of \$150,000 will pay anoth-er \$130.50 in property taxes, up 5.9 epreent, beginning July 1.
School trustees approved the an-nual butget June 6, an increase of \$11 million from last year's proved budget. However, the 1988-89

budget was amended several times during the year, causing the district to actually spend \$5 million more than when the document was initial-

than when the document was initially approved.
The district will levy 32.39 mills, an increase of 1.74 mills, for the coming year. This is the maximum the district can levy because of the Headlee Tax Limitation Amendment. It is still nearly five mills below the 37.29 mills approved by volters but which had to be rolled back under the Headlee amendment.

The district is hoping to use some of the money to make a dent in the \$17 million in needed building renovations and repairs. The original \$20 million figure used last fall has been reduced because of money already spent for asbestos removal work.

Skyrocketing health care costs, increasing about 31 percent this year, are also a concern.

The district is also eyeing potential liability from the state if it is forced to pay Social Security taxes — now paid by the state — and if

The new bugget allows the district not only to get more money from levying additional millage, but to capture money from increased property assessments in both Farmington and Farmington Hills and part of West Bloomfield Township, which make up the school district.

The total state equalized value for property in the Farmington district is now \$2.1 billion.

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


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
