Farmington grad on her way to Naval Academy

It's not just a job — it's an adven-ture, says the U.S. Navy in its re-cruiting commercials.

Maureen O'Dell, who graduated June 13 from Farmington High, will begin one of the longest adventures of her life, one that few women ever

of her life, one that few women ever experience.

When she arrives at the Naval Academy on July 3, O'Dell will become a part of an ellie group where only the best of the best, and roughly 100 women, are accepted each year.

When she began the application process 13 months ago, admission to the Naval Academy seemed like an impossible dream for O'Dell, so the Nomination from U.S. Sen, Don Reigle, D-Michigan, in mid-December (the academy requires either a congressional or senatorial nomination for consideration) came as a pleas-

for consideration) came as a pleas-nat surprise.

The battle had just begun, however, and O'Dell settled down to wait for the academy to narrow the appli-cants down from 14,000 to 25,00, and finally to 1,600, approximately 1,500 will be enrolled for the next year.

Only 8 percent of those students selected are women.

"ALL TIE waiting was very hard for me," O'Dell said. "Most of my friends' plans loss at ter were already finalized, and I still want sure where I was going. I had been accepted to U-M earlier, and they were beginning to get restiers." Being one of these chosen few entitles O'Dell to many privileges, she will attend four years of schooling at
