IN 1915, the house and property were sold to Luman Goodenough, a prominent Detroit lawyer who used it as a summer home for his wife and three small children. They moved in permanently in 1918.

Weich's book cites this house as the first in the area to be "electri-fied" and to install a telephone.

After the deaths of Mr. and Mrs. Goodenough, their surviving chilldren, Eleanor Spicer, Daniel Goodenough and Elizabeth Schemm, honored their parents wishes by donating the home and five acres of land to the community in 1988.

In 1979, the Michigan Historical Commission designated the center as a State Historical Site. A marker is along Farmington Road near the gate in the stone wall.

health care and vacation benefits.
