ORTUNE FROWNED on Mike Logan when he was born but his determination and tenacity won him a

Logan, 19 and a spina bifida victim, has endured 22 operations since he was born on April 13, 1970 in Providence Hospital in Southfield. The first operation was a birth. Spina bifida is a congenital deformity at the base of the spine in which the spine does not form com-

pletely. The cause of the condition is unknown and there is no cure. When I was born they noticed that my spine was open," said Logan. "They went rigbt in and classed it right up. There was a bubble with the nerves coming out and they sewed it back up, but all those nerves were damaged. Those nerves controlled the lower part of my limbs and they were totally destroyed."

Boisford Hospital last summer.
"I was a go-fer." said Logan. "I like to help out people. I'm sympathetic to other peoplers' problems."
Logan performed a variety of tasks, two days a week at Boisford Hospital. "I was in the stroke unit and helped clean the therapy mats that patients lite on."
Logan was nominated for the FYA award by Mike Teachman, his basketball coach at Harrison High School.

head which drains the cerebral fluid

Two or three of those shunt revisions
were emergency surgeries," said Logan.

Through the years, he has also had.

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Through the years, he has also had operations and surgeries in Chil-dren's Hospital, Mott Hospital, And Arbor, Mount Carmel Mercy Hospi-tal, Detroit and Beaumont Hospital. Logan has had steel rods placed in his back to hold his spine and six inches of his right lower rib re-moved.

Every time a new operation was needed, Logan said he became de-spondent.

An upbeat attitude pulls Logan through. He strives to be self sufficient. He drives a Cutlass Supreme with hand controls. Logan works part-time at the pharmacy counter a Perry drug store, 12 Mile and Farmington, and is the first wheel-chair employee at the store.

"He seems well-mannered and highly intelligent," said manager Chuck Hainley.
