members in Michigan and Ohio, re-aponded to the requests of its em-ployees in fall 1085 by setting up a Parenting Tightrope Action (PTA) committee.

The PIA, which is jointly run by partners and staff members, addresses issues of concern and belps catabilist company policies in such arters as parental leave, child care

and work schedules.

"WE NEEDED to establish a prepriam that would help parenting staff members return to work after the birth of a child," said Mary Jeakins, director of public relations for Placet and Moran.

"The mission of the PTA committee is to enable staff members to balance their roles as parents and professionals."

As a result, a policy was issued that now permits up to 21 weeks of parental leave after the birth or adoption of a child.

Both male and female staff members are entitled to this leave. The committee also provides day




care information for new parents and sponsors parenting seminars, during which time the company provides baby-aitting facilities.

FOR THE past two years, Plante and Moran has also provided a fully linanced, or-site child care program at the Southfield location on Saturdaya during tax season.
