Delay City Vote Until November

The Farmington City Council has agreed by consensus, to have city elections held bi-annually in the fall on odd years.
 The election scheduled for this spring will not be held until Nov. 2. The seven-month delay results from passage of House Bill 239 which was signed by Gov. Milliken on Dec. 22.
 Incumbent councilmen scheduled for election between Nov. 3, 1971, and Nov. 5, 1973, will not be up for election until the 1973 general election, explained City Manager John Dinan. The result is that all the present city councilmen will have a seven-month extension of their terms.

The provision was automatic and applies to all cities except those which choose to exercise an option in the bill and adopt a resolution to continue the spring election.
 Cities wishing to retain the spring elections have until midnight Jan. 22 to exercise their option. The Farmington City Council has decided not to exercise an option and will reschedule their election to Nov. 2, 1971, as provided by HB 239.

If the school board should decide to hold trustee elections in November of odd years, all elections in Farmington would be held in the fall except for any special votes such as millage votes.

Planning Position On Agenda

APPOINTMENT of a member to the planning commission is scheduled for Monday night's meeting of the Farmington Township Board of Trustees. The trustees will be asked to confirm appointment to be made by Supervisor Earl Teeples to fill a vacancy on the planning commission.
 A special ceremony honoring the North Farmington High School football team will begin at 7 p.m. with the trustees' meeting scheduled to start at 8 p.m. in the Township Hall at 11 Mile and Orchard Lake.
 Also on the agenda is a report from the township attorney on proposed unsafe building ordinance.

THE CITY COUNCIL will have some ordinance changes to make to change local election procedures to coordinate the shift to the fall vote.
 The city is expected to adopt an ordinance eliminating the necessity of holding a primary election each August before the general election.
 The council is now studying the dates elected candidates will take office. The state law provides that successful candidates will take office on Jan. 1 but allows cities to pick an earlier date by ordinance.
 Dinan told the council it might want to pick a date one or two weeks after the election for candidates to assume office to avoid any seven-to-eight week lame-duck sessions.
