Displaced Homemaker program continues

Jewish Vocational Service (JVS), a non-sectarian agency, offers an ongoing Displaced Homemaker Program funded by the Michigan Department of Labor, Office of Women and Work, for individuals in Wayne and Oakland Counties.

Displaced homemakers are women who, through divorce, separation, widowhood, or disability of spouse, have lost their source of economic support. After spending a substantial number of years in the home caring for family members, displaced homemakers find returning to the job market a difficult transition.

The JVS Displace Homemaker Program provides vocational assessment, vocational counseling, job seeking skills and job placement assistance. Women who need to become financially self-sufficient, who need a boost toward entering the job market after many years in the home, are invited to contact JVS. Eligibility is based on marital and employment status. There are no income guidelines.

American composers with the exception of the benediction, written by an English composer John Rutter.

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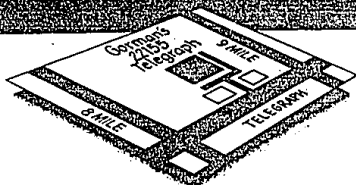
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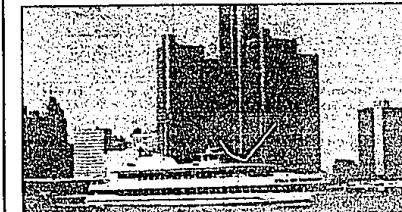
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
