

# No-hitter ranks as highlight

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She finished the year with 616 sets for kills and 59 aces for the Raiders, who won 10 straight dual matches in the Western Lakes Activities Association before being upset by Walled Lake Central. North was a semifinalist in the league meet.

"It's kinda funny because you have to set a certain way for each hitter," Weintraub said. "If you're a little off, you hear about it. You have to know who the hitter is and get the right set, so they can hit it as fast as they can."

WEINTRAUB, who achieved a 3.8 grade-point average and will attend Michigan State University, would like to continue playing for the Spartans.

"I'm thinking about trying out for volleyball, but I think it's a long shot," she said.

In softball, Weintraub was North's pitcher — a reluctant pitcher. The second-team, all-area selection would have preferred second base or an outfield position.

"I was the pitcher because I could get it over (the plate)," she said. "At the beginning of my junior year we had other pitchers, but they worked too many and that's how I got stuck pitching."

She accepted her role, however, and took the edge off the situation by poking fun at her lack of velocity.

Weintraub, who finished the season with a 7-3 record, 1.70 ERA, 281 batting average and 15 RBIs, had a career highlight when she pitched a no-hitter to lead the

Raiders past eventual WLAAC champion Northville, 3-1. In doing so, she got the better of two-time, all-league pitcher Amy Friemund.

"THAT WAS awesome, knowing they were undefeated," said Weintraub, who walked two and had no strikeouts. "We were tied going into the last inning, and then we knew 'OK, we can beat them' — and when we did that was great. And having the no-hitter that made it even better."

Weintraub played guard on the basketball team, which had a 14-9 record. Most of the scoring was left to Eve Clear and Kim Gurecki, and Weintraub, who averaged six points, filled the role of playmaker.

The Raiders were an underrated team, twice nearly upsetting perennial power Plymouth Salem, but they made the district tournament exciting.

North knocked off Walled Lake Central — a team it hadn't beaten in four previous meetings — in the first game and moved into the final with a victory over West Bloomfield. But the Cinderella tournament run ended with a loss to Walled Lake Western in the final.

"After we chose Central (in the draw), we really got motivated and started working for it," Weintraub said. "After we beat them, we thought we were ready for anything — until we got to Western."

It was hard to end the season after that game. Everyone was down, but we went further than we expected."

## O&E event short of female entries

Unless something dramatic happens between today and Wednesday, the last battle for supremacy in the women's Observer & Eccentric/Whispering Willows Golf Tournament may have already been waged.

Even with a late rally, there may not be much of a battle for top honors. The 1988 champion, Ann Lauer, originally from Birmingham but now living in Auburn Hills, returns to defend her title. However, her child rival — Erica Zonder of Farmington Hills — won't be back.

Zonder is preparing for her sophomore year at University of Michigan. She was one of the Wolverines' top golfers last year, and has been working hard at getting even better.

"I've been playing a ton of golf all summer," she said. "I'm through now until school starts."

She's NOT the only one who's been playing more and improving. What will no doubt be viewed with dismay by her challengers, Lauer has joined the Michigan Women's Publix Association, and has trimmed her handicap from seven to six.

Lauer, who has played in the tournament since '83 and has won three titles, is hoping to get the chance to defend her title as best female golfer in the O&E area, although she's disappointed Zonder won't be entered.



No one can give a single reason for slipping participation (\$5 or more every year until '88, when entries were down 22); rather, there could be several causes. The number of tournaments and leagues now available to women may be the biggest.

"Exactly," agreed Lauer. "There's more leagues, and there's definitely more tournaments. I would have had a problem if this tournament would have been on the 19th, because the State Publix tournament is that day."

THEN THERE'S the increasing number of women in the work force, further reducing the field.

Lauer doesn't help, either. Other than Zonder and Geraldyn Repasky of Livonia, who became a teaching pro after the '85 tournament and is ineligible, no one has been a serious threat to win the title.

"You get me and Ann out of there and it would probably be fairer for everyone else," said Zonder.

Several players complained about midday tee times last year, which meant players had to compete during the hottest, and slowest, part of the day. That should be less of a problem this year, with the tournament date changed from a Saturday to a Wednesday, a switch that was made in an effort to attract more women.

So far, the move hasn't worked. But there still time, entries will be accepted until 6 p.m. Wednesday. Remember: Prizes will be awarded in three flights, and the \$22 fee includes a free lunch (an entry coupon can be found in this section).
