Longtime resident Johannes Emig has donated a picture he painted of the Masoule Temple at Grand River and Farmington Road to the city of Farmington. The oil on canvas painting of the historic building will be displayed permanently in the Farmington City Hall on Liberty Street.

Recent streetscape improve-ments and facade renovations in downtown Farmington inspired Emily's artistic endeavor.

Working as an engineer helped fuel his creative spirit.



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# Gynecologist investigated

A Farmington Hills gynecologist is under investigation by the state attorney general's office after eight Medicaid patients complained about being overcharged, according to news reports.

Armed with a search warrant, investigators from the State Attorney General Health Care Fraud Division seized medical records Tuesday morning at the Western Women's Center, 23700 Orchard Lake Road, Farmington Hills.

ington Hills police, removed several boxes of medical records from the office of Dr. Jacob Kalo.

No charges have been filled, said Chris DeWitt, spokesman for Attor-ncy General Frank Kelley. DeWitt confirmed that the clinic is under in-vestigation but would not specify why. It is located in a medical builti-ing south of 10 Mile.

"There's no reason for me to clear my name, I have not been charged with anything," Kalo said, "The whole thing is completely ridiculous,

The amount of money involved is less than \$500, Kalo said. He said be has made refunds to four of the women and has been unable to contact the other four. The mixry Is a result of a question of whether Medicald would pay for the medical services rendered, he said.

"We weren't sure if they should be charged," said Kalo, who has spent six of his nine years of private prac-tice at Western Women's Center.

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
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
