Novi City Council took another step toward making the proposed Haggerty Raad Connector a reality by adopting a resolution of "Inde-pendent utility" at its Aug. 23 meet-

The decision was far from unani-mous, however, as the council ap-proved the resolution on a 4-3 vote. City Manager Edward Kriewall said approval of the "independent utility" resolution is important to the

The resolution was requested by officials from the Michigan Department of Transpertation (MDOT) at an Aug. 9 meeting of the communities directly affected by the Haggerty Road Connector Project and the Oakhand County Road Commission.

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
