KATHY, WHO has blue eyes and long, wavy strawberry blonde hair, said she's going to miss her new friends and "glong to the beach." She's looking forward to Irish food, and "playing soccer and hurling with my brothers and friends."

What she derads about going home is "gust all the British soldiers shooting and fighting all the time, and just the feeling of people dying.
"Ever since I was little, two or three times every year, the soldiers have raided our house. It's scary. They come really early, at 1 o the morning. They kick the door. If no one answers, they try and kick." "They have guns and does and

no one answers, they try and kick it.

"They have guns and dogs and they get everyone downstairs, and search the house. They look under the carpet, and look in the attic. They wreck the house looking for guns and bombs. They've never found any.

"If all the British soldiers were put out of Ireland, there would be no more trouble over there," she said.
"If the British don't leave, there will just be sadness. It will always be the same."
