Instead of firing bullets, though, the 65-year-old gentleman with a crew cut was flinging a softball past batters Friday at Canton Softball

batters Fritary at Camous Concerter.

A team from Pat Boyle Chevrolet was the foil for Eddle Felgare and his four-man squad's antics.

Lighting and the threat of rain cut the program short but not before Felgare was shie to show off his reperiore of trick pitches that has brought more than 17 million people out to see him perform in the last 44 years.

White didn't have a good night. He had to stand in the batter's box while Pelgner uncorked some understand fastballs while wearing a biladfold.

"The catcher told me 'Watch it. He's getting old. He doesn't know where it's going." White said. "It was scary."
When he wasn't throwing sinkers, Felgner dipped into some basehall banter, Van Prooyan relieved Felgner on the mound for one inning, striking out the side.

er on the mound for one inning, strik-ing out the side. If Feigner, calling to his third baseman Gary West af-ter Van Prooyan unleashed a wicked strike. "You know what that was? "What?" "His Linda Ronstadt pitch?" "Yeh," sald Feigner, "Blew by you."

AS THREATENING clouds and lightning grew near, Feigner decided

to call an end to the game. He then gave a quick demonstration of the different plitches he's perfected through the years, including the windmill, the figure eight and the dead ball which floats to home plate. Felguer has lost a bit of rip from his festball that once clock more than 100 miles per hour, but he's still as craftly as ever, striking out batters at will.

The show is one of thousands The King and His Court has performed in more than 100 countries. Proceeds from the game at Canton Softball Center went to Caring Athletes Team for Children's and Henry Ford Hospitals.

After the demonstration, Felguer sat down in the dugout as old and young alike lined up for autographs from the legend. Several adults recalled seeing The King before.

"I saw you play 20 years ago in Jackson," said one older gentleman, shaking The King's hand.



Boyle Chevy finishes 7th in nation

Curtis Richards, the pitcher for the Pat Boyle Chevro-let modified men's fast-pitch softball team, was named to the All-America team after his ballclub finished ev-enth in the 55-team national tournament Labor Day weekend in Decatur, Ala.

Richards pitched 42 innings and posted an earned run average of 0.14. While allowing 33 hits, he struck out 10 and walked 11. Al While of Plymouth, who played for Miami, Fla., team that took runner-up honors, was the

other All-America pitcher.

Boyle Chevrolet, winning four of six games, opened with a 4-0 victory over JLS Construction of Staten Island, N.Y. The game was delayed because of rain and didn't begin until 3:15 a.m. Saturday.

In a three-run third inning, Dave Brubaker ripped a two-run double, and Richards, who was 2-for-3, also doubled to score a run. Tim Bowden hit a sacrifice fly

Boyle Chevrolet won its next two games, 8-2 over Ralph Jones Insurance of Decatur Saturday afternoon and 13-1 over Chiro Network of Baton Rouge, La., Sunand 13-1 over day morning.

ROD ARQUETTE was 2-for-4, which included a first-inning grand slam after three consecutive walks, against Ralph Jones. Don Dreher hit a two-run double and Steve Dawson an RBI triple. It was Keith McManaway's turn to produce the grand

slam in the game with Chiro Network, again after three straight walks from the opposing pitcher. McManaway was 3-for-3 with five RBI.
Richards was 2-for-4 and had two RBI, Bowden hit a pair of sacrifice files for a pair of RBI and Brubaker hit a run-producing double. Arquette also had two RBI with a single and bases-loaded walk.
