

InCAR, white supremacists have often clashed

The Southern Poverty Law Center's Klanwatch Project in Montgomery, Ala., publishes its Klanwatch Intelligence Report six times a year.

The center monitors the activities of white supremacists throughout the United States.

The International Committee Against Racism (InCAR), which plans to demonstrate with a bullhorn and flags against the neo-Nazi Security Services Action Group at a peace march for racial harmony Sunday in Farmington, is mentioned in the August 1989 report.

"InCAR, affiliated with the Communist Progressive Labor Party and based in New York, has a membership of 1,500 to 2,000, according to the ADL (Anti-Defamation League).

InCAR members have remained secretive about their leadership, but are open about the group's goals: to crush white supremacist activity through violence."

According to the report, in June 1987, about 30 InCAR members joined Jewish Defense League members against white supremacists meeting at a Glendale, Calif., library. During the brawl, a Klanman sustained facial injuries and others also were hurt. An InCAR member was charged with disturbing the peace.

"At least 17 people were arrested and at least six police officers were injured in Marquette Park in Chicago in 1986 when thousands of Klan members and their supporters clashed with anti-racist protesters, including about 100 InCAR members. InCAR was also involved in last year's Marquette Park clash,

where police made 14 arrests and broke up several scuffles," said the report.

Further, the report states that InCAR members instigated violence at Klan marches in Meriden, Conn., and San Jose, Calif., in 1981. "In both cases, Klan members were hit by rocks thrown by angry demonstrators."

LOCALLY, InCAR and the Secur-

ity Services Action Group have clashed in front of the Ann Arbor Federal Building, in Lansing and on I-96, according to Richard Lobenz, regional director of the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith in Southfield.

"They throw baby bottles filled with bleach and rocks," said John Moriarty, who plans to lead the neo-Nazi demonstration Sunday in Farmington.

On Wednesday morning, three InCAR members — two men and a woman — were arrested on misdemeanor trespassing charges after distributing handbills at Farmington High School.

A man who identified himself as Larry Goldbetter paid the \$200 bond. He called Monday to say the group was getting an unfair rap by the "naive" media. He cited the historical violence of the Ku Klux Klan and the skinheads, who he said, often accompany S.S. Action Group demonstrators.

"They (white supremacists) have beaten people to death," Goldbetter said. "They all carry out racist terror. We put a couple of Nazi groups out of business around here in the early 1970s."

He said InCAR, too, has a "track record for physical violence. Pacifism doesn't defeat the terror. I lost

family in concentration camps. I was born Jewish but I'm not religious."

GOLDBETTER VOICED a frustration that the legal system, the Communist Party, Zionists and groups like the Anti-Defamation League aren't doing enough. He doesn't feel the Nazis have a right to freedom of speech just to spout hate messages. He denounced the police protection they receive.

He said InCAR is distributing flyers in Detroit and organizing counter-demonstrations. The Oct. 11 issue of its newspaper, "Challenge," invites the public to "smash Nazis and Skinheads" at the "planned racist rally" in Farmington.

Goldbetter said, however, that he wished the words "covered with blood" would have been deleted from a previous InCAR handbill.

SINCE LAST October, Dunn, 37, of Southfield has been serving a five-year sentence in a low-security federal prison camp in Hartsville, Miss. Following his conviction for possessing to distribute controlled substances, said Ron King, an information officer at the camp.

In demonstrations across metro-Detroit the last 10 years, S.S. Action Group leaders often have used false names.

Moriarty, hit on the head with a wine bottle in a 1982 demonstration

in Birmingham, has called himself John Reich. He did the same at a Farmington rally in December 1984 to promote capital punishment.

Moriarty told Frank Lauhoff, Farmington public safety director, that the S.S. Action Group will not show up if the peace marchers don't. He doesn't want to see any police officers hurt.

"The Klan is totally different; we are totally political," Moriarty said. "We will help any white power group in a legal manner."

Moriarty attended the Aryan Nations meeting Sept. 29 to Oct. 1 in Tennessee, he said.

FIVE YEARS ago, United Feature Syndicate discovered how difficult it was to trace group members.

In the United Feature Syndicate Inc. vs. National Socialist case filed in September 1984, the syndicate charged copyright infringement stemming from use of the Charlie Brown character in the "Peanuts" cartoon strip, created by Charles Schulz.

Charlie Brown was pictured on white supremacist recruitment and promotional stationery, making racist, anti-black and anti-Semitic statements.

"There was this little boy, Charlie

Brown character, saying these horrendous things," said Robert Gorlin, an attorney for United Feature Syndicate.

Named as one of the defendants in the case was Moriarty. Gorlin said copyright infringement is common throughout the United States.

Also listed as defendants were: National Socialist S.S. Action Group, Edward James Dunn a.k.a. Mark Heinrich, Michael Kolverin, Michigan Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, the National Association for the Advancement of White People and Rocky Suhayda.

GORLIN, WHO then worked for the Detroit law firm of Dykema, Gossett, Spencer, Goodnow and Trigg, said that Moriarty was the only defendant the firm could track down because the others used post office boxes.

"We couldn't find the defendants," Gorlin said. "We couldn't serve them. We couldn't even find them to do battle. They weren't exactly the leading citizens in the community. The case never went to court, never went to deposition."

Ann Arbor Judge George LaPlata issued a consent judgment and permanent injunction against Moriarty in 1986. No fines were levied.

He (Moriarty) denied everything," Gorlin said.

Moriarty attributed blame to another man "who entered the organization."

In preparing for the peace march, Moriarty cited recent instances of what he calls reverse racism: the Rev. James Holey's protest of white Detroit councilwoman Maryann Mahafey possibly becoming Detroit City Council president and a request by Jewish leaders that a Roman Catholic convent of nuns be moved from a site where the German death camp Auschwitz was located.

"We're for love of country and love of race," he said.

Success readies for peach march

said. No reasons were given by Dianne, she said.

Their "life change" in Farmington since then has been punctuated by near-daily racial insults, Derwin Success said. But the family, residents for four years, has reported only two such incidents to police.

Police have not closed the investigation of two 1987 incidents, which occurred on Dec. 22 and 23.

The case is inactive, according to an Aug. 21 case review from Deputy Director Gary Goss to Director Frank Lauhoff. That report, obtained under a Freedom of Information request, ruled out an attempted "breaking and entering of the Successes' garage door because the three glass panes that were broken were those farthest from the door

lock.

The extreme defacing Dec. 23 brought police back again. All sides of the house were touched except the front, said the report. The FBI was notified.

Farmington Commander Peter Amato and officer Edward Lang, who completed the investigation, have since left the department. They commented at the time on the amount of media coverage Success was receiving. The media were notified before the police, according to the officer's report.

SUCCESS SAID a ticket the city of Farmington issued him in July for a zoning violation over his tall stockade fence he was building around his

back yard for security helped plant the seed for starting the peach march. Success started to build the fence before receiving a height variance from the city.

Success, 32, holds two master's degrees from Eastern Michigan University — in guidance, counseling and personnel and in communications. He has a bachelor's degree in psychology from Madonna College in Livonia.

He is applying to a doctoral studies program at the Union Institute in Cincinnati.

In August, Success, a Saginaw native, faced scrutiny about his credibility when he was seen wearing the collar of a clergyman. A candidate for the ministry, he is an assistant to

the Rev. Alonzo Vincent at Berea-St. Paul in Highland Park, but has not been ordained.

Success and wife have operated self-esteem and motivational programs for children and adults.

A MONTH ago, Success suggested five suggestions for racial harmony that he has yet to present to city officials.

He called for a proclamation recognizing Martin Luther King's birthday, designating February as Black History Month, creating a biracial task force, teaching the diversity of culture in the elementary schools and hiring one black person for the public safety department or the city hall staff.
