The petition was circulated during the dedication of Ploncer Park May 21. "I don't recall this issue of 100 (signatures) being sald," city manager William Costick sald in response

"I can get more (signatures) if you want. I thought council members always looked at stuff. Everyone who signed it felt that there should be a sidewalk there."

The first petition cited safety. A second petition that Regan circulated at North Farmington High School had 25 signatures (rom people who could not attend the Spt. 18 meeting but who volced support of the sidewalk proposal. A "Tew signatures" were from students, she said.

COUNCIL/WOMAN JODY Soronen said neither her vote would be changed nor her view that sidewalks

were needed along Farmington Road. "This is still one of the most Important certifors in which to have a sidewalk," she said.

Councilman Aido Vagnozzi, who signed the carlier petition, was also unswayed by Sowerby's revelation. "I've walked Farmington Road on both sides, and I tell you, there is a need for a sidewalk, I don't think we need sidewalks on both sides. I did not see misrepresentation."
