Since opening Country Miniatures Sour years ago, Siano has been determined to dispet the myth that the miniature and dollihouse hobby is expensive and complicated.

"A lot of customers come into the shop worried that this hobby will be too difficult or too costly for them," said Siano, "We let them know right away that this hobby has no barriers — it can be adopted for any skill level or budget."

house, the more costly it is. Depend-ing on how much the customer wants to spend, Slano can design an appro-priate dollhouse and miniature pack-

As for the interior of the house, most of the miniatures in the shop fall into at least two price categories with a less and more expensive version. The price of the miniatures is determined by several variables including the materials that compose the item as well as where the Item was manufactured.

SIANO ALSO helps customers with their assembly and finishing whether they are beginners or veteran collectors.

"Our advertisements claim 'no question is too dumb' and we mean it," said Siano. "When I first became interested in this hobby, I was given a lot of misinformatica so I had to teach myself. I learned that this hobby can be as easy or complicated as you want it to be. The one thing it requires is a little imagination."

In addition to helping customers create their own houses, Country Miniatures will also remodel old dollhouses or custom-make a house according to a customer's specifica-tions.



Wanek began painting at 83 for no other reason than to full in the time after his wife died.
"It was my only outlet. The only thing I could bese myself in," he said. A subsequent stroke didn't stop the creativity. At age 65 he learned how to paint with his felt hand and is still taking commissions.

It was in 1941 that he married Jessic, one of his customers, who worked with him in the business until they closed the shop and retired together to Port Huron. Jessie died year and a half later.
