Fire results in evacuation of Dimitri's

An accidental kitchen fire prompted the orderly executation of diners and employees at Dimitri's restaurant in downtown Farmington during junchlime on Wednesday.

The restaurant, at 35200 Grand River, was filled at the time the fire was reported about 1:25 p.m.

A buildup of heat radiating from the booded vent over the oven ignit-ed high-pressure sodal lines running through the adjacent wall, said Com-mander Thomas Cox of the Farm-ington Department of Public Safety. Flames were confined to the base of the wall. The roof directly above

sustained some charring. Fire-flighters ventilated the kitchen to re-move the smoke.

Fire was knocked down within five minutes, and firefighters cleared after about one hour, Cox said.

Man charged in ram attempt

A 36-year-old Romulus man faces three counts of felonious assault in connection with a highway incident in which a motorist tried to ram two other cars containing three people Monday in Farmington Hills.

At an arraignment Tuesday in 47th District Court in Farmington, Judge Fred Harris entered an innocent plea on behalf of Frederick William Lake Jr.

Harris set bond at \$10,000 pending a preliminary exam on the charges. Conviction of felonious assault carries up to four years in prison. According to Farmington Hills detective Jerry McKennie, a motorist apparently became agilated and tried to ram two other cars on east-bound M-102, near Grand River about 4:40 p.m. Monday. The motorist wound up iosing control of his car. The car left the road-

way and Jijpped onto its roof in a ditch on the north side. The motorist cot out and man when police arrived, they found a man hiding in a ditch on the south side of the road. They chased him to westbound Grand River and muck, where they arrested him. He apparently austained minor injuries in the crash. Police do not believe he had been wearing his seat belt.
