# Guess Who Wrote C'ville Objectives

The ironies of life have a way of cropping up when you least expect them.

A flabbergasted Clarenceville Board of Education attested to that after an incident at its Jan. 14 session.

One of the items on the agenda had to do with the forthcoming evaluation of the high school by the North Central Accreditation Association.

Background material supplied by Supt. David McDowell stated that a requirement of the evaluation, held every seven years, is that the high school staff develop a philosophy and a series of objectives.

In presenting the material for the board's perusal (no official action is needed), McDowell commented: "In reading them, I find them complementary to the philosophy as stated by the board of education" in its policies and procedures.

SCANNING the 5½-page document, board members were mildly critical. Chief objection was over a section that stated: "To meet the individual needs of the students, the school should provide... concern with overall development of student rather than only subject matter in the classroom."

The board then asked the names of the committee members who drafted the aims and objectives.

And here's where the mockingly ironic twist had its full impact.

The board learned that the committee was headed by Leo DalBo, highly criticized math teacher whose name

has almost become a household word in the school district for his recent confrontations with the board.

Much of the controversy stems from DalBo's involvement last spring in a student attempt to get board recognition for a political action club at the high school. He then gained community-wide attention in his attempts to have a public hearing held at the high school in order to put an end to the personal harassment he says has been going on ever since.

IN ALL fairness, Dr. Ray Renbarger, high school principal, explained to the board that DalBo took the chairmanship of the committee when none of the other faculty members would do so.

The committee has been working very hard on the document, since last spring, Dr. Renbarger said.
