

# District win sends Hawks into tournament title game

Farmington Hills Harrison's rugged regular-season schedule was an asset Monday in post-season soccer play.

The Hawks, who took a 1-12 record into the game played at Harrison, won their district tournament opener over Dearborn Heights Crestwood, a presumably better team with a 12-5-1.

Harrison defeated the Chargers 2-1 and advanced to the Class B final against Dearborn at 10 a.m. Saturday at Schoolcraft College.

"We played well and that just shows how strong the Western Lakes (Activities Association) is," Harrison coach Glenn Breuhan said.

The Hawks led 1-0 on an unassisted goal by Mark Lebovitz and limited Crestwood to just one shot in the first half. Harrison made it 2-0 two minutes into the second half with Patrick Maitrepierre's goal.

But it was a rough game that nearly got out of control, according to Breuhan. After a Crestwood player received a yellow card, a Harrison player was red-carded and ejected from the game for using improper language. The Chargers also converted the indirect kick that re-

sulted.

"The momentum shifted in the second half after the red card," Breuhan said. "Because we had to play with 10 players and shifted the emphasis to defense."

"We didn't want to do that, but we had to play defensive soccer. They were starting to outplay us, and they had some good chances. We were very happy to get out of there with a 2-1 win."

"We dominated the first half," he added, "and I think we would have continued to dominate if we hadn't been red-carded."

FARMINGTON 5, NOVI 1: Mike Gammerrath scored two goals Monday as the Falcons earned the right to play in the Class A championship. Livonia Stevenson in the second round of the district.

"It was nice to get the qualifier and go on to play Stevenson," Farmington coach Cathy Cole said. "I

know there will be a lot of heart and emotion displayed on the field."

The teams tied 1-1 when they played during the regular season. The Falcons were 7-4-4 entering the game.

Mike Walker's unassisted goal and Gammerrath's first tally, coming on a pass from Tim Shelton, made it 2-0 at halftime.

Chris Johnston and Gammerrath increased the margin to 4-0 before Novi averted a shutout in the second half. Gary Kurzer added an insurance goal for Farmington. Kurzer, Mike Giese and Rob Cook also had second-half assists.

"We wanted to take as many shots as we could and pad the situation," Cole said. The Falcons outshot Novi 27-6. "In this type of (tournament) play, teams are capable of putting pressure on you. Every team is vying to play its best."

## CC harriers claim league championship

It was a good day for Mike Sheridan and the Redford Catholic Central boys cross country team, as well as for Redford Bishop Borgess freshman Eric Shepard at the Catholic League championships Saturday at Marshbank Park.

Ranked the No. 2 team in Class A by a statewide coaches poll, CC captured its second straight league title with 51 points, followed by Birmingham Brother Rice (69), Dearborn Divine Child (80), Warren DeLaSalle (84) and University of Detroit-Jesuit High (119).

Eric Shepard, a ninth-grader at Borgess, won the 5,000-meter girls race in 20:09. Teammate Rose Segura also made All-Catholic League, finishing ninth in 22:28. Dearborn Divine Child was the girls team champion, scoring 36 points. Rounding out the field were Farmington Hills Mercy (72), Harper Woods Regina (100) and Ladywood (114) and Riverview Gabriel Richard (132).

POSTING THEIR second straight unbeaten league season, the Shamrocks were again led by Sheridan, who won for the 10th time in 12 meets.

The senior grabbed first in 16:13, after passing second-place finisher Bob Lee of U-D with a half mile to go. Lee's time was 16:16.

Rounding out the CC contingent were Chris Antezak, seventh place, 17:13; Jay Schemanske, eighth, 17:14; Dave Galvin, 13th, 17:55; Pat Dimer, 22nd, 17:53; and Jack Massarelli, 23rd, 18:02.

Tie-in meet starts at 11:30 a.m. with Plymouth Canton and Plymouth Salem also expected to challenge for team berths in the state meet, set for Saturday, Nov. 4, at IMA-Brookwood Golf Course near Flint.

In the girls league meet, the Marlins placed four girls on the All-Catholic team, which consists of the top 20 finishers.

Mercy's Brigitte Dery was third (21:25), giving her all-league honors for a third straight year. Lauren Hood was seventh (22:24), Cara McDonagh 18th (23:37) and Carrie Goebel 20th (23:58). Jenny Andes nearly made it five Mercy runners on the team, finishing 24th (24:27).

DIVINE CHILD, led by second-place finisher Amy Ballint, had six runners in the top 25. Mercy coach Gary Servais knew the Falcons would be tough to beat when they had four of the top six runners at his running camp last summer.

"At the end of camp, I didn't think we'd come very close, but we narrowed the gap quite a bit," Servais said. "They dominated but not as much as I thought they might."

Servais' teams have finished first or second in the Catholic League for the last six years. His Regina teams won three straight championships (1984-86), and he coached the Marlins to the title in 1987. Mercy, undefeated in Central Division duals this year, has been the league runner-up the last two years.

Farmington fought off a late rally Tuesday by visiting Walled Lake Central as the Falcons earned a Lakes Division victory, 49-46.
