And roast the Redford team they did, with a score of 30-12.


Judges for the float competition, Brinker said, were chosen because they had no direct contact with the students.




Four year old Nancy Finney, daughter of social studies teacher David Finney, carries the roses that will be presented to Homecoming Queen during half-time.
