Organizational Meeting Set For Livonia AAUW

Organization of a new branch of the American Association of University Women is beginning in Livonia.

Women college graduates interested in exploring world problems, cultural interests, social problems, and the growing challenges to education are invited to an organizational meeting, Jan. 25.

It will be held at 8 p.m. at the home of Mrs. A. Medwedeff, 15556 Fairlane, Livonia. The president of the Michigan Division of AAUW, Mrs. George Timmons of Ann Arbor, will address the group.

AAUW, Mrs. Medwedeff said, is a national organization dedicated to a program to help college women continue their own intellectual

growth and to further the educational advancement of women generally.

During 1971-73, the Association's study program will focus on four topics: "A Distant World," "The Crisis in Public Education," "We the People," and "The Belonged Earth." Under its legislative program, AAUW also maintains a national lobby to promote the passage of sound educational and social legislation.

Today there are more than 1,650 AAUW branches. Membership is open to any woman who holds a college degree from an accredited university. Since the association is a member of the International Federation of University Women, graduates of

most foreign colleges are also eligible.

THREE AREA WOMEN, long active in AAUW activities, are spearheading the organization of this new Livonia branch. They are: Mrs. Medwedeff, first vice-president of the Farmington AAUW; Mrs. John Haas, past president of the Plymouth branch; and Mrs. R. Griniger, past president of the Farmington branch. These women, while remaining active in their respective branch activities, have volunteered to help organize a Livonia group.
