Highly sought-after members of the health care profession

HEN KATHLEEN Dobbs was working as a regis-tered nurse IEN KATILLEIN Dobbs was working as a registered nurse at Henry ford Hospital in Detroit about 10 years ago she saw physician assistants in action. And the more she saw, the more the field appeared to her. Today she is one. "Not a great deal of people know exactly what a physician assistant is," the Farmington resident said. "There are exactly 643 of them in Michigan. And for every one of them there are 20 jobs waiting.

"The field is so wide open you can just about pick and rhoose where you want to work and what you want to specialize in," she said.

Dobbs went back to school to be-come certified, was hired by Harper Hospital, and works with two physi-

cians who specialize in head and neck cancer.

"That was my choice. That is what I wanted," she said.

She has a few 12 hour days in her schedule and has two small children at home but still linds time to be an adjunct faculty member at Mercy College, teaching physician assistant student classes. And she is an active member of the Michigan Academy of Physician Assistants, which promotes the role of the physician assistants and acts as the waterholog agency for legislative concerns.

A PHSYCIAN assistant is a mid-level health professional who through education and training is qualified to provide a wide range of medical care and care in a specialty area. They work under physician su-pervision and can perform many of the tasks traditionally done by the obsession.

The assistants practice in almost all health care settings, but are probably best known for their pattent education and counseling skills. "For most of us R's a second career for people who have had exposure to working in health care." Dobbs said.

"There is no doubt in my mind that of the people I know in this field we all could have all been accepted into medical school. For a very few being an assistant was a stepping stone (some have become doctors). But for most of us this is what we are and this is what we are and their is what we want to be.

Physician assistant programs were begun in the midd-1960s to offset a shortness of doctors. In 1975 there were fewer than 1,500 practic gin the U.S. 76day there are about 25,000 physician assistants in the country, including the part-timers. And the job market remains strong in most states.

Average pay is \$33,000 a year.


