Under the agreement, the city has adopted a three-year plan for the period ending April 30, 1991. Each year, the city must submit an application to the county describing the specific projects that will be undertaken in carrying out the plan.

The plan, adopted by council on Aug 17, 1997, was based on a yearly grant of \$33,701. Gouncil planned to allocate \$27,201 to support the downtown development program and \$7,500 to home improvement toans.
