somebody at work. I knew it from watching TV and stuff."

But the freshmen also learned the technique the previous week in a study unit of their required health class, part of a new curriculum implemented in the district this year. "All the ninth graders learned that in their health classes," said principal Jerry Potter. "That ties the curriculum together with reality."

IT WAS certainly reality for the two students, who said the incident showed them just how quickly a life-

and-death situation can occur. "I was shaking the whole day," said Moore, who said he and classmates were shocked. "They were stunned. We were joking one minute — then he was all red."

Allen said she had flashbacks over the past weekend, thinking about the incident.

Moore said if a similar incident occurred in the future, "I'd still be nervous, but probably a little more confident."

The Farmington Department of Public Safety was called on the emergency 9-1-1 line, but the call was cancelled after it appeared the choking youth was all right.


