

## 2 Hills Depression houses designated historic homes

The Great Depression put a glitch in the 1920s development of the Oak-lands subdivision at 13 Mile and Orc-hard Lake Road, delaying develop-ment until the 1950s.

The Bach House on Ardmore at Firwood, and the Model House for the Oaklands Subdivision on Green Acres at Bond, are examples of the type of homes built in the subdivision, "part of the get out to the country" move, said Farmington Hills Mayor-Elect Jean Fox, also a local historian.

Though only 60-years-old, the houses are considered historical and ave been placed in the city's histor-e district by the Farmington Hills

Michigan's first woman architect, Emily Butterfield, a 20-year Farmington resident. Her father, Wells, was the first Farmington mayor.

Though she worked with her architect father, Butterfield's sorority sisters said, "she actually did the designing," said Futh Mochlman, Farmington Hills Historic District Commission vice chair.

"These two homes might not be regarded as historical by some people, given their more recent vintage than others," said Paul Bilizman, historic district commission chair.

"They represent a style, a quality, that would have been a great benefit to our community."

THE HOWARD Bond family — of Bond Elementary School and Bond Street fame — began developing the subdivision in the mid-1920s. The de-pression slowed development. Full-

page advertisements in the Farmington Enterprise depicted the dream of moving out to the country in what turned out to bl a financially unfortunate time in American history, Fox said.


The model house for the subdivi-sion was designed in the arts-and-crafts style, a style similar to one used by Frank Lloyd Wright. The house, for example, features pewa-bic tite, Mochiman said.

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The Bach house is an example of 
"historic style," a two-story colonial, 
which also boasts a Japacese influence. The original owner conducted 
what has come to be known as marketing. He researched what new 
homeowners in the 1920s wheel in a 
new subdivision. Gardeb, golf 
courses and tennis courts — much 
like today — are what peopic wanted, Mochiman said.
