

## PTA Will Hear Jursa

FARMINGTON Ronald J. Jursa, director of the division of student financial aids in the Michigan Department of Education, will be guest speaker at a special meeting of the Ten Mile School PTA, Jan. 27, beginning at 7:30 a.m. at the Ten Mile School, Ten Mile Road at Powers, in Farmington.

Jursa, who directs the state's \$12.8 million a year scholarship, tuition and loan programs, will discuss the "Pros and Cons of a College Degree." A question and answer period will follow.

Jursa received his bachelor's and master's degrees from Boston University

where he also earned Phi Beta Kappa recognition. He has had additional graduate work at the University of Oslo in Norway, University of Michigan and Michigan State University.

Jursa was associate director of admissions and director of the scholarship office at MSU from 1961-66. From 1955-61, he served as a high school teacher and principal. A recognized expert in his field, Jursa is a past president of the National Association of State Scholarship Programs.
