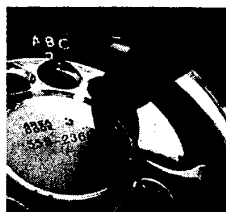

pired in January when Gardhouse would have been up for reappointment.

MRS. BENYA has served well on the commission for the past two months, said Mrs. Schaeffer, adding that there should be more women in government.

Mrs. Schaeffer added that Mrs. Benya has a B.S. degree in industrial development, is administrator for the Farmington Chamber of Commerce, a board member of the Farmington Area YMCA, Township of Farmington Beautification Committee, A.A.U.W., and has been active in Little League and PTA.

"I feel we are losing a terrific member of the planning commission if we lose Barbara," added Mrs. Schaeffer. Stader supported Mrs. Schaeffer who stated he saw no good reason why Mrs. Benya should not be reappointed to the commission. Teeple's replied that Mrs. Benya had not included all of her background in her resume and he would be glad to reconsider her for the appointment.

But the supervisor would not nominate her at Monday night's meeting. Teeple's said he was concerned that Mrs. Benya was hard-pressed for time because of her many community activities, and he felt more representation was needed on the planning commission from the south end. Mrs. Benya lives in Kendallwood subdivision.

"I think Barb has done well and will continue to do well," stated Treasurer Thomas Nolan.

"You don't ask any man to drop any activities," said Mrs. Schaeffer, "and you just appointed Mr. Rydell as a representative of the south end and Mrs. Grace Richardson who is now on the commission lives in the south end."

TRUSTEE Earl Oppenheimer and Nolan both indicated they were prepared to vote against ratification of all nominations until Mrs. Benya was appointed.

Oppenheimer had obtained an informal opinion from Joseph T. Brennan, township attorney, that Mrs. Benya will continue to serve on the commission until reappointed or until a successor is appointed.

Stader added that Teeple's was not really filling a vacancy but "kicking someone off the commission" by not reappointing her. He described it as an unwarranted slap in the face.
