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Search for hit-and-run driver at a standstill

Redford Township traffic police investigators say their search for a hit-and-run driver, whose car struck and seriously injured a 14-year-old girl on Christmas Eve, is again at a standstill. standstill.

standstill. Investigators said Tuesday that they checked out a few leads but found no suspect. "We were receiving about two calls a day for a while but the calls have stopped coming and we're back to square one, waiting for something

to develop," Redford traffic police Lt. Eric Plater said. "We've had about seven calls from people providing information on cars that possibly were involved in the accident. "Four of the cars we checked had front end damage to the grille. One even had a missing hubcap that was the same type we found at the acci-dent scene and one of the windshield wipers was missing. "We thought we had the driver, but the grille damage on his car did not match up with the section of grille we found at the accident scene," Plater said. "The other car grilles didn't
