

Generic stock footage livens up programs

Even in the world of community television, we have to determine how long to keep our television shows. Our practice has been to keep the original program and schedule it on the channel for three months. At this time, we (MetroVision staff) contact the producer for direction on how to proceed, whether the program should continue to be broadcast or whether the producer should secure a copy and then have the videotape blank erased and recycled.

OUR PROJECT this winter, including SWOCC and MetroVision staff, is to organize selected generic stock footage.

This footage will be made available to all producers to liven up the quality and visual interest of a program. These tapes will be topically categorized for easy recognition and insertion as B-roll into your program.

We also look to this project as an ongoing library to enable us to be

able to bring local news more effectively onto Channel 12.

Please be alert to your own program footage as you log your show. On the log sheet, which is necessary to record the in and out points of the program, specify in bold print where within the body of your show is the footage that may be used for our stock footage library. Sign your name beside this notice so that we have permission to use it.

THOSE OF you who are involved with community television are very welcome to attend any cable meeting.

Once doing so, please think where you would enjoy being involved. "Enjoy" is an important factor to volunteering. We are especially pleased to be able to provide a community service where we also offer the volunteer new skills and opportunities as well.
