2 students capitalize; suspect is held

Eric Eneyed and Jim Surowiec insist that their idea to market T-shirts labeled "I got bombed at Oakland University" was not borne out of bad taste.

Just the opposite, maintain the two Oakland University students.

"This is the American way," said Surowiec, 21, a senior from Farmington Hills. "We jumped on it, just like Andrew Carnegie would have done."

But campus officials disagreed, and prohibited Surowiec and Eneyed from peddling their goods in the university's Student Center.

"We wouldn't have done this if someone was hurt," said Eneyed, a 21-year-old senior from Southfield. "But since no one was, we figured we'd have some fun with it."

That was the prevailing mood Friday on the 12,000-student campus in Auburn Hills, after Wednesday's incident in which three pipe bombs exploded in and around the campus library.

The first bomb exploded at 2:20 p.m. Wednesday on the fourth floor of the Kresge Library, in the heart of campus.

A second bomb exploded five minutes later under a 1982 Chevrolet in a parking lot behind the library. Two hours later, a third bomb exploded beneath a car in a parking lot west of the library.

Print and electronic journalists rushed to Oakland University after the bombings to interview students like OU junior Paul Jenkins.

No one was injured in any of the explosions. But school officials, acting cautiously, closed the campus Thursday.

By Friday, however, students were already talking of throwing weekend "bomb parties." Others tried putting together theories for why the incident occurred in the first place.

That question is sure to come up today again, as Jerry S. Guglielmo, 19, of Pontiac, is scheduled for arraignment this morning before a U.S. Magistrate on charges of using

explosives in a state building where federal money is involved.

Guglielmo, a former OU student, was arrested Thursday after state police discovered stolen materials to make pipe bombs at his home in the 100 block of Poplar Street in Pontiac.

GUGLIELMO is also facing charges of stealing ski equipment on

Oct. 30 from Mount Holly Ski Area in Groveland Township. He was arraigned Friday in Pontiac's 50th District Court on burglary charges and is being held in Oakland County Jail in lieu of a \$50,000 personal bond.

It convicted on the federal charge, Guglielmo could face a 10-year prison sentence and/or a \$250,000 fine.

On Friday, police were still looking for Guglielmo's roommate, who is also suspected in Wednesday's bombings.

University spokesman Jim Llewellyn said little is known about Guglielmo, aside from the fact he graduated from Holly High School, and attended OU during the fall semester.

Guglielmo had registered for the 1990 winter semester, but withdrew Dec. 19 without explanation, Llewellyn said.

Although he did not have a declared major, his grades were good enough to return to OU, Llewellyn added.

No added security measures will be taken as a result of the bombings, Llewellyn said. "With the coming and going of 12,000 students, what can you do?" he asked.

15th State Senate District

JACK FAXON, D-Farmington Hills moved north out of Detroit in 1982, just as his former Detroit constituents did. He has turned more conservative on tax issues over the years, just as his elderly constituents have.

At 53, Faxon has spent half his lifetime in Lansing as Constitutional Convention delegate, state representative (six years) and senator (19 years).

Republicans targeted him in 1986 and fell a whopping 14 percent short. There is talk again of targeting his district, which sprawls from the old

Democratic south end cities westward to the Republican precincts of Novi and Wixom.

Mike Bouchard, the Republican president of the Beverly Hills Village Council and runner-up to Jan Drilan as 69th District state representative, is expected to do the honors this time. "I'm very, very interested," Bouchard says. To compete, he would have to move out of Beverly and into the 15th District covering Southfield, the Farmingtons, Berkley and Novi.

A former teacher, Faxon craves any attention and gets it. Walk into any Senate session, and Faxon is sure to be delivering a colorful speech, often in sentences that run 200 words long. A champion of arts funding, Faxon is amply rewarded with invitations to narrate "Peter and the Wolf" and to perform in "The Nutcracker" ballet.
