Campbell is being held in the Oakland County Jail in lieu of 325,000 cash/surety bond pending arraignment before Oakland County Circuit Judge Fred Mester Feb. 9. He faces up to 15 years in prison if convicted. According to further testimony during a preliminary examination in 48th District Court last April 18:

Bonelli then entered Nader's car. saying he had "turned the headlights on" Fracchia as she lay in the lake.

Miller contended that Bonelli wanted to make it appear as though Fratechia's death was an accident. Nader testified that on the return trip from Orchard Lake, Bonelli described the events teading up to Fracchia's death.

NADER ADMITTED supplying Bonelli with gloves and marijuana, which Nader said he placed near Bonelli's home on the same day Fracchla died.

Nader sald he had already been told by Bonelli that Bonelli planned to kill Fracchia. Nader sald he pro-vided the gloves and marijuana for Bonelli because "I owed him a fa-

Nader said he left a good-luck note for Bonelli but that he only half-be-lieved that Bonelli was serious about murdering Fracchia.




