## Raiders outmuscle Falcons, 67-57

North Farmington, apparently tired of being pushed around by the smaller Falcons, put its height ad-vantage to good use in the second half of its 67-57 victory.

"The three big kids played well at the end, and that was the difference. We got the ball to some people in the box, and they started scoring," North coach Tom Negoshian said.

The big kids are Eric Carlson, Bill Chwalik and Eric Detter, but Carl-son, the tallest one at 6-foot-6, was foremost among them this night.

Carlson racked up a game-high 19 points on seven field goals and 5-of-7 free throw shooting to lead the Raid-ers. 5-1 in the Lakes Division and 8-4 overall.

North, leading 48-45, af-ter three, posted the first eight points of the final quarter to com-plete a 21-4 run that put the Raidees en top 56-45 with 6<sup>1</sup> minutes re-maining.

Hoffman, who sank two triples earlier, made two three-point plays during that stretch. Detter scored six points, Carlson four. Chwalik capped it with a layup and another three-point play for the Raiders.
