# Raiders stay No. 1 in city volleyball

North Farmington continues its reign as the champion of Farming ton high school volleyhall, but for a time Monday, its right to the throne was in doubt.

The Raiders, who beat host Farmington Hills Harrison in the final, were tested by Farmington and the Hawks in the annual Observer tournament before subduing each opponent in two garnes.

North has claimed the trophy for three straight years and seven of the

three straight years and seven of the last eight. Harrison's victory in 1987 is the only time the Raiders haven't

North started with the day with a fash and ended with a flurry, winning the first and last games easily. In between, the Raiders struggled but managed to survive.

The Raiders whipped the Falcons 15-3 in the opener but barely escaped with an 18-16 victory in the second. After watching, the Hawks eliminate Farmington 15-8, 15-12. North eked out a 15-12 win in the first game of the final and cruised home with the clincher, 15-6.

"WE'VE DONE that all year."
North coach Sandy Lubieniecki said.
"The first game with Harrison was a continuation. They were fired up because they had just beaten Farmington, and you've got to take that momentum back."
The Hawks held the lead — their higgest margin being 9-5 — until late in the first game. North tied it at 11 and capitalized on three Harrison errors and a Vikki Seamons ace to win it.
