First capital was in N.Y.C.

New York City was chosen by the U.S. Congress in Sept. 1788, as the first site of the new nation's capital, and retained this distinction for a short time. Vocational aptitude tests to be given

The Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery test (ASVAB) will be given in Farmington Community School, 30415 Shiawassee.

Test dates will be 6 p.m. Thursday, March 15, and 9 a.m. Friday, March 16. There is no charge for the test. The school is at the corner of Shiawassee and Tuck roads between Orchard Lake and Middlebelt roads.

The ASVAB is sponsored by the U.S. Department of Defense, but one need not necessarily be interested in pursuing a military career to take the test. The test can be an effective starting point for exploring careers

and job possibilities.

"If more information is wanted about how interests can relate to possible job areas, take the test and let it help you," said Terry Leland, high school completion coordinator.

A government test administrator will give the test. Students are strongly encouraged to register prior to the testing date by calling the Farmington Community School office at 489-3333 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and 7-9 p.m. Call Leland for further information.

THERE IS no passing or failing on

an aptitude test. Rather, the test will determine aptitude or potential to acquire a skill or ability that may be needed for a job.

There is no obligation to join any branch of the military service. ASVAB is a service that is paid by tax dollars.

The test is a vocational aptitude battery consisting of 10 short timed tests covering the areas of general science, arithmetic reasoning, word knowledge, paragraph comprehension, numerical operations, coding speed, auto and shop information, mathematics knowledge, mechanical comprehension, and electronic information.

Results of the 10 individual tests are combined to provide three "academic" and four "occupational" composite scores.

The academic composites are verbal, math and academic ability; the occupational composites are mechanical, electronics and electrical, health, social and technology.

The results of the test reflect both military and civilian jobs. They should be returned to the students within three weeks.

Search begins for 1991s Miss Teenage America
