## Foreign aid boosts St. Mary's

In case you've never seen it, the site upon which St. Mary's College rests it as picturesque as any imaginable. IN HIS FIRST year at St. Mary's, erichow has been nothing short of antastic. The 6-foot-8, 20-year-old reshman forward has played all 35 ames for the Eagles and is their

second-leading scorer, averaging 13.2 points a game while making 55.6 percent of his floor shots. He is also second on the team in rebounding, getting 7.5 a contest.

But his most noteworthy ability comes on defense. Jerichow was the leading shot-blocker in the NAIA District 23. He swatted away 157 shots — about 4.5 per game. That skill was not evident when St. Mary's coach Glen Donahue first recruited Jerichow. "We thought he had the ability, but when we saw him play he didn't block a lot of shots."
