Stingrays continue reign

Following three days of competition at the U.S. Swimming 13-and-up short-course championships in East Lansing, the Stingrays captured another state title Sunming 13-ar

Lansing, the Stingrays captured another state use out-day night.

The Stingrays, who compiled 1,108½ points in Michi-gan State University's McGaffree Pool, overcame a two-day deficit of more than 60 points, to edge the rival Onkind Live Vers, who finished with 1,107 points.

"I was thrilled for our swimmers, but at the same time a bit and," Stingrays coach Peter Leonhards said. "Our kids swam great all weekend and really came through on Sunday night.

"But OLY's swimmers awam great, too. I feel for them. I guess the luck of those green shampocks we were wearing rubbed off. A 1½-point difference! I have never seen a meet this large so close?

never seen a meet this large so close."

MORE THAN 500 of the state's best swimmers from more than 40 teams competed in the statewide meet.

The close victory for the Stingrays was in sharp contrast to previous Stingray long-course (60-meter pool) and short-course (25 yards) consecutive state titles dating back to 1987. Leoshard! was madeelded in singling out any group or individual swimmer who made the difference for the Stingrays.

"It was a total team victory," he said. "Our 45 boys and girls — most of whom also swim for over 15 area high schools."—can better appreciate the value of placing 12th in a race to score one polnt, first for 16 points or just cheering their teammates on."

Beginning with Sunday's events, the Live Yers were shed of the Stingrays 28 to 1994. The turnaround started with the 200-yard backstoke and 100 freestyle received.

But the Stingrays got a boost in the girls 200 butterfly, placing 1-2-4-5-7 for 57 points to OLY's single sixth
place for nine points.

FITTINGLY, it was in the same pool that Mark Spitz, the gold-medal winner in the 1972 Olympics who is at-tempting a comeback for the 1992 Games, set 10a at 200 butterfly pool records, also in 1972. The records still

stand.
The boys butterfly events concluded the evening's in-dividual events with the Slingrays clinging to a 3½-point edge, 982½ to 975 with four relays to go.
The Live Yers took the lead again in the first relay, the girls 13-14 409. Their A and B fearns scored while

the Stingrays scored with their A relay only, Teams are allowed to enter up to two teams per relay event.

The Stingray boys 400 freestyle relay recovered 12 points by outplacing OLY's sole centry.

The meet was left to be decided by each team's older swimmers, all of whom have had many years of experience swimming at crunch time. Each team had A and B relays in the final races, the 400 freestyle.

The Stingray A girls set the pace, swimming a quick, 3:3.99 to nother lists place and 32 points. The Stingray B team was third for 24 points. OLY's girls met the challenge, taking second and fourth for a combined 48 points.

THE SCORE following nearly 30 hours of racing and with one race remaining was the Stingrays 1,668%, the Live Yers 1,065.

Leonhardt huddled briefly with assistants Jeff Cooper, Steve Matheny and Laurie Hubbard.

"We chose our fastest eight freestylers, told them to pull out all the stops and go for broke," Leonhardt said. Live Yers coach Scott Teeters likewise set his guns to claim the victory. His B relay swam earlier in the day in 3:20.01, good enough for an eventual sixth place. To win, his A team had to outplace the Stingray A squad while the Stingray B team needed to fall well below 3:20.

3:20. All eyes were set upon the race starter. His gun sounded at 0:30 p.m., and victory for one of these teams was three minutes away.

The Stingray A took second for 28 points with a fast time of 3:24.88. The Live Yers were a shade behind in third place, and the Stingray B bent but did not fade, swimming 3:20.22, good enough for seventh place. The placings gave the Stingrays 40 points, the Live Yers 42.

THE RESULTS were quickly tabulated and announced to the news-hungry crowd: Stingrays first, OLY second. The cheers subsided as fast as they rose, however, as these totals did not include the final relay.

The final numbers came seconds later: Stingrays 1,1084s, the Live Yers 1,107.

The victory earned Loonbardt and Cooper a traditional pool bath as both were tossed in by their young swimmers.

North's Heller is co-champ on vault

As sure as night turns to day and winter becomes spring, North Farmington is always among the state's top gymnastics teams.

The Raiders were led by junior Heather Kahn, who was runner-up to state champion Kim Miller of Salem in the all-around, and senior Kym Heller, who finished her career winning an individual co-championship on wall

Kahn, who scored 35.00 in the all-around Friday, also qualified for the finals Saturday on every event but the balance beam.

"She's been so dang consistent." Dwyer said. "She beat Kristie Kelly of Freeland and the all-arounders from Dow. She did re-ally well, con-idering the pressure of the meet." Heller, who scored 35.60 in the all-around and placed sixth, also had a great meet, according to Dwyer.

AS A SENIOR, she was subsequently selected for the four-person Michigan team that will compete against the top gymnasts from other states later this spring in Nebraska. Kelly, Dow's Tracee Lewis and Ann Arbor Pioneer's Tammy Crocker also are on the elite squad.

"That's quite an honor," Dwyer said. "It was a great way to go out."
