"We're assuming, by virtue of where the metal separated (from the jet engine), that it's due to the expansion and contraction of the metal," said FAA supervisor Larry McCartney at Willow Run Airport, Pisilanti. The Farmington wire products plant has shut down operations after Jist parent company annunced last year it would close by mid-February if a buyer were not found.
The close will be shuffly a shuffly and the close the close will be shuffly a shuffly annuager Mike Callahan. "We're getting ready to show the building." Some half a million dollars in equipment was sold to a company in Arkansas and moved over the past two months.

The 90,900-square-foot building once housed a viable, busy company that made wire baskets and shelving and brought 100 salarled and hourly jobs to the city of Farmington.

Started as a family business in the 1940s, and in Farmington since 1963s, and in Farmington since 1963s, Chesley was the second largest company, by size, in the city and the 11th argest laxpayer, according to city records.

Started by the local Chesley family, it was most recently owned by the Hussmann Corp. of St. Louis, which bought it from the family in 1972.

The Chesley Industries building is

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owned by Hussmann, It was built in 1963, with additions put on in 1964, 1968 and 1982. The building, of which 86,000-square-feet represents plant space, sits on nearly three acres. It has a state equalized value of \$951,000, making it worth nearly \$2 million on the open market.

Mile, east of Farmington Road. City officials said earlier this year, vacancy rates along the corridor are small.

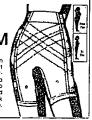
