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## **Concealed weapons charge** irks Farmington mechanic

A Farmington mechanic charged with carrying a concealed weapon in Farmington Hills said he doesn't think meat people realize it's unlaw-ful to carry a double-edged, non-idit-ing knife in their metor vehicle. Roger J. Jagosz, 28, Precision Tune manager, said he uses that kind of knife as a general-purpose tool. The knife has a four-inch blade and is 7% inches long, police said. At work, Jagosz carries the knife on his belt loop. But when in his pick-up, he said, he put it on the dash "so it didn't poke the seat."

It didn't poke the seat." Jagosz said he used the knife "to cut vacuum lines or hoses in the sta-tion and when on road calls. Almost very mechanic I know uses one." "I didn't know it was not legal to carry it – now look at the heil I'm going through," said Jagosz, a Preci-sion Tune employee for 7% years. "I may have made a mistake, but I didn't commit a crime," he said. "There was no illegal use intended.

I'll demand a trial by jury if necessary." Jagosz has no police record, said Sgt. Charles Nebus, Farmington Hills Police Department Detective Section supervisor.

"WE CHARGE according to a Now strict interpretation of the law," said Oakland County assistant prosecutor Michael Cox. "And the law is pretty clear that people can't carry in the passenger compartment of their ve-hicle a knile of the sort seized."

In Jagosz's case, "the knife was on the dashboard within easy access of the driver," Cox said. "That's some-thing we considered."

thing we considered." Appearing before District Judge Margaret Schaeffer of Farmington Wednesday, Jagosz walved his right to a preliminary exam on a charge of carrying a conceled weapon. He will be arraigned before Oak-land County Circuit Judge Hildo Gage April 17.0 M March 27. District Judge Fred Harris entered an inno-cent plea on Jagosz's behall and set a \$2,600 personal recognizance bond. If convicted of the felony charge.
